

THE SPEAKERS

Professor Patrick Crotty is a native of Fermoy, and is currently Professor of Irish & Scottish Literature at the University of Aberdeen, where he teaches on the Celtic and English programmes.

Professor Tadhg O'Keeffe teaches in the School of Archaeology University College Dublin, where he specialises in medieval architecture.

Dr. Paul Rondelez is an independent scholar specialising in late medieval iron production in Ireland. The Irish blast-furnace iron industry has been a main research topic.

Anja Bakker is a Dutch Canadian recorder player, harpist and singer. She is a multiple award winning graduate of CIT with a love for Early Music and an interest in Bardic Harping Traditions and Medieval Pilgrimages.

Mícheál Ó Súilleabháin is Chair of Music and Founder/Director of the Irish World Academy of Music and Dance at the University of Limerick, and is widely known for his development of a uniquely Irish traditional piano style.

Professor Raymond Gillespie is Professor at the Dept. of History, NUI Maynooth. His main research interest is social change in Early Modern Ireland.

Professor Pádraig Ó Macháin was formerly Professor at the Dublin Institute for Advanced Studies where he was responsible for the digitisation of the Book of Fermoy. He is currently Professor of Modern Irish, and Head of the School of Irish Learning at University College Cork.

Dr. John McCafferty is Director of the Mícheál Ó Cléirigh Institute at University College Dublin, a collaboration between the Irish Franciscans and the university. He specialises in the history of religion in late medieval and early modern Ireland.

Dr. James Kelly, MRIA, is Cregan Professor of History at St Patrick's College, Dublin City University. His main research interests lie in the areas of Irish political and social history in the period 1660-1820

John R Bowen is a noted silver scholar, particularly in the area of Irish Provincial Silver, and has curated exhibitions of silver at the Crawford Art Gallery and at the Hunt Museum.

Dr. David J. Butler is a graduate of University College Cork. He is a committed researcher on the history of family, and lectures on history and genealogy at University of Limerick and University College, Cork.

LOCATION

The conference opening reception will take place at AIB Bank, Pearse Square.

All lectures will be held in the Fermoy Community Youth Centre. The Centre is located in the heart of Fermoy, on the south bank of the Blackwater about 200 metres upriver from the bridge, past the Grand Hotel.

DIRECTIONS TO THE VENUE:

If coming from the Dublin or Mallow directions take a right turn immediately after crossing the bridge; if coming from the Cork direction proceed to the centre of town, follow the signs for Dublin, then turn left immediately before coming to the bridge.

Proceed past the Grand Hotel to the point where the street narrows. The Centre is on the left at the corner.

Parking is available on-street or in the nearby library carpark. Both are free up to 1 pm on Saturday and all day Sunday.

ACCOMMODATION

The Grand Hotel is only two minutes walk from the venue. Corbett Court Hotel is located about 8km north of Fermoy, on the R639.
